Since 2000, Theresa and Ethos Career Management Group have provided career planning and job search services. Ethos operates three distinct programs which serve more than 6,000 clients each year. RE-45 is a five-week career planning and job search program for mature workers offered in Nanaimo. Shorter, satellite versions of the program are offered in Parksville and Duncan. Trades and Technology Program offers individuals of all ages an opportunity to research careers in trades and technology. This mobile program is also offered in Duncan. CARE is a collection of job search resources, including a job board, resource centre with computers, workshops on job search, work skills, and career planning, and career counselling. Ethos also offers instruction in basic computer skills, either through in-house workshops, or on-line. All services are highly professional and are free to clients.

This is the reason why the General Assembly of the United Nations proclaimed the **United Nations Literacy Decade** for the period 2003-2012. The goal is to make a difference in this world so that everyone has access to literacy in ways that are relevant and meaningful.

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The Decade focuses on the needs of adults with the goal that people everywhere should be able to use literacy to communicate within their own community, in the wider society and beyond.

Literacy efforts have so far failed to reach the poorest and most marginalised groups of people – the Decade particularly address these people, under the banner of **Literacy for all: voice for all, learning for all**.
