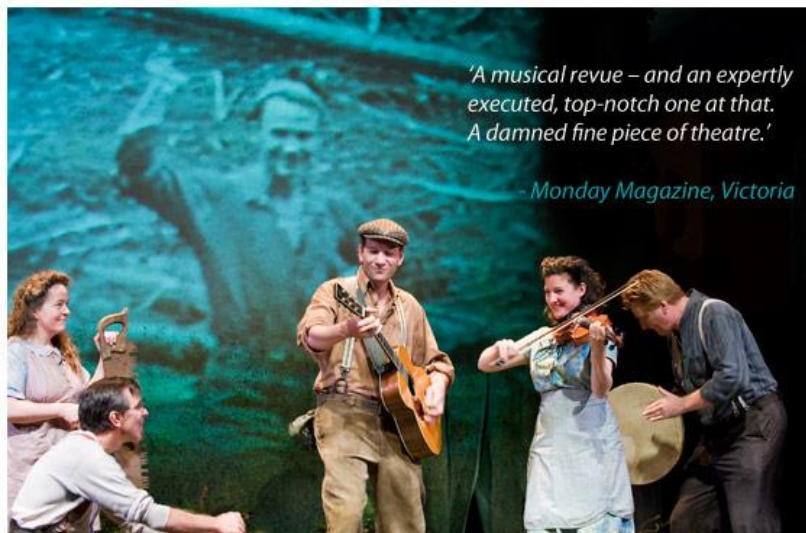

Meeting Notes - August 14th

Nathan Thornton was at the door taking payment from all the meeting goers. Don Bonner and Ev Mudryk were eagerly extending their warm welcome. President Randall Taylor summoned the start of the meeting by striking his gavel. Rod Mont was able to give his musical accompaniment to our national anthem.

We had a few visiting Rotarians and a guest as well. Rotarian Tim Rabbit was visiting from the Strathcona Sunrise Club in Comox Valley. Asst. Governor Barry Sparks joined us for breakfast as well. Bill Brendon introduced his friend Randy Spensley. Denise Larson introduced her brother Mark....sorry it was Paul and his wife Diane Lucier from Windsor.

Daryl Knievel, in his capacity as sergeant allocated tables for breakfast and this time he was generous enough to select the unofficial boys table first, as some of the members had to leave early.

Anna Jones did her Rotary moment for which she got the ideas from online about how to encourage the young members to get involved in clubs. Her suggestion, get them involved in service activities before they get lost in the crowd.

Randy Spensley, a kidney transplant recipient, was our speaker today. His topic was kidney failure and donor registry. Bill introduced him and spoke with some personal touch about the whole incidence of donating his kidney. They have been friends for more than 14 years, along with their wives. Randy suffered an illness and needed a kidney to survive. There was a long list of donors, but, as a friend, Bill was very unlikely to be a good match. That is what Bill had thought initially. However, he became the most generous donor of all to Randy's life.

During those days, Randy was going for four hours of dialysis two times a week. He was not able to take a bath, only a shower, for four years, as he recalls his last bath in Ireland while he was travelling.

As a donor and recipient, they both had to go for rigorous testing and blood work for six months. Finally, Bill was the perfect match.

On the day of the transplant, they operated on Bill first, and then it was Randy's turn. Due to all those frequent dialysis sessions, Randy's bladder was shrunk and he now had to go to washroom very frequently. "Billy the Kidney" was on its full swing, working harder for Randy. Yes, that was the name given to the transplanted kidney. Since the procedure was done at S.t Paul's Hospital, he has been going for regular check-ups.

He spoke about the Kidney Foundation of Canada's PR campaign called "Kidney Hero" Save life, recycle for life. He explained that there are different types of transplants available today. Among them are human, animal and artificial.

Human can be through living donor or deceased. Deceased donors are becoming less available.

Last year there were 194 kidney transplants done, whereas 381 people were still waiting. There are huge demands for organs like heart, lung, and liver. Of all the different organs, total of 366 transplants were carried out, whereas 482 patients were still waiting. He sincerely requested everybody to consider being an organ donor.

Randy gave a quick "Kidney 101" to the club. The main function of the kidney is to filter the blood and send the waste to the bladder. The function of the kidney is measured as "Glomerular filtration rate" (GFR) which should be 80% or higher. If the GFR is lower, then it could be the sign of kidney failure, which shows as high blood pressure, puffiness in the eyes, hands and feet, fatigue, loss of weight, loss of appetite. There could be blood in urine.

The treatment involves: 1. Diet 2. Dialysis 3. Transplant. Dialysis is very time consuming and stressful. It involves food and fluid restriction with lots of medications. It affects the whole family. It hampers work and there are possible side effects.

Kidney transplant will free up an individual from all of those complications. There is a financial benefit as well for doing transplant procedure. Dialysis done for 10 years in hospital will cost \$600,000 per individual. Due to its clear benefits with transplant, the "living Kidney", a donors network, has come up with a concept called "paired kidney exchange programme". This has allowed two incompatible donor and recipient pairs to get the benefit from another compatible donor who is in the network. If anybody wants to be in the network, they have to get registered as a donor in BC Transplant Society.

Bill is doing a kidney fundraiser by walking. Please support him. He ended with a happy note that both the donor, Bill, and the recipient, Randy, were doing fine. Then it was followed by Q/A.
