

Meeting Notes - November 4th, 2009

Another week in Rotary Daybreak. Dawne Anderson and Nelson Allen were ably greeting at the front door. Our Rotary day started differently. We were treated to the singing voice of our saxophonist Rod Mont. Great pipes indeed! Wendi stood in for Daryl Stech (cruising south) and we had Rod back on deck with the introduction of guests. Nelson intro'd our Guest Speaker Doug Sly, and Doug Lum intro'd their daughter Miranda, who, coincidentally, was celebrating her twelfth birthday today.

Randall Taylor's Rotary Minute detailed the intricacies of the Rotary Council on Legislation. The Council meets every three years and in April 2010 will review the enactments, which seek change in the constitutional documents of RI, Bylaws & Clubs, and resolutions that make recommendations for change. Randall discussed how an enactment recommendation, from his previous Club for 'Corporate Membership' had now reached the Council for their deliberation. Interesting to view the items they are considering. Rotary.org has more details.

Nelson introduced our Guest Speaker Doug Sly and detailed his persistence in getting the opportunity to speak with us. (Sometimes three calls in one day) Doug noted he scouted our location yesterday in the daylight. Then, Doug's technical difficulties changed our format. Nelson continued on with a reminder about the District World Community Service Workshop to be held on November 28th at VIU. President Dave noted that he had known our speaker previously, as they both sang in a choir

Valerie mentioned that her Fireside chat on the 17th would be modelled the formal "English Tea," so come hungry. Francine Frisson can't manage her builders. She will have to forgo here Fireside evening as her home is still not done. (Or would that be Jaap's fault?) And who remember the substitute?

Rod discussed the 50/50 tickets (again) and he has now successfully sold them all, that being, those who have not arranged for their return has now bought them. The East/West Finals are on the 22nd on November, (First part of the 50/50 draw) and our Grey Cup Party is Sunday 29th at Costin Hall, Lantzville. Which brought Jim McIvor out of the woodwork to reiterate that tickets for our Grey Cup Party are available for \$25, which includes all the salt your blood pressure can handle (aka munchies) plus a steak dinner, compliments of Chef Bruce, done to perfection on Daryl's Sharecost BBQ. Dawne Anderson spoke of the importance of the Sally Ann Kettle drive and per usual, many of our members have stepped up to help.

President Dave mentioned the upcoming *Rotary Adventure in Citizenship Programme*, hosted by the Rotary Club of Ottawa, since 1951. Do we have any perspective candidates? The Adventure includes four days in Ottawa from May 2-5 with 220 students selected from across Canada, aged 16-19. We funded a student in years past, at a cost of \$600.

Christine Craigie also promoted a social night with *Christmas with the Canadian Tenors*, including the VI Symphony, on Saturday December 5th at 7:30 PM. As of this Saturday the 7th, we have 11 going. Be quick; call Christine if you want to go. Dinner before the show could be Beer & Burger fundraiser for Mid Island Ability Society at the Harewood Arms Pub at 6'ish. Please let Jeff Boegel know your intentions.

Compliments of our Bill Brendon, technospecialist extraordinaire, we were then able to proceed with Doug Sly's presentation. Doug related how he became involved with a Kenyan School. A member of his former Ontario Parish was in Western Kenya doing research on swine. The local animals were not penned, thus ate everything, and were rife with diseases. These diseases were transmitted to humans because of poor cooking methods. Whilst there, Kate Dewey became deeply affected by the plight of the local AID's orphans. Upon her return to Canada, she persuaded the Church Parish to subsidize about 160 students with \$15,000 pledged over five years. This allowed the students have uniforms, which was a requirement for entry to the local school. Next, they funded food: starting at one meal/week for grades one and two, gradually to become 5 meals/week for the entire school. Their agreement with the School was they would become self-sustaining in six years. To that end, the school rented land, to produce maize, and now produces eggs. The school population has now increased to 1,000 children. Doug's video of the
